The Opioid Crisis

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Client Population of Interest

- ▶ Opioid-related overdose contributed to over 67,000 deaths from September 2016 to August 2017, a 13.3% increase from the previous year.
- ▶ 80% of new heroin users report previously misusing prescription opioids.
- Most opioid dependence cases and overdoses occur in those who are either uninsured, unemployed or have a low income.
- ▶ The United States faces an opioid epidemic.
- ▶ The presentation is focused on opioid abusers and the crises they face.

What is an Opioid

- ▶ Opioids are a class of drugs with high abuse potential that include:
- ▶ 1) pain relievers legally available via prescription, such as codeine, morphine, oxycodone, and hydrocodone
- ▶ 2) illegal drugs such as heroin
- ▶ 3)legally available and illegal synthetic opioids such as fentanyl.

Three Phases of Injury Prevention

- Preventing the drug from reaching the host (pre-event)
- Minimizing the likelihood of injury when drug and host interact (event)
- Minimizing the subsequent harms (post-event)

Types of Crises Opioid Abusers May Encounter and Why

- Addiction (Do not forget heroin) (pre-event)
- Overdose (physical tolerance for opioids, which can be built up over time with regular use, decreases rapidly during periods of abstinence...as a consequence, rates of overdose are high) (event)
- ► Loss of Home (post-event)
- Children being removed from the homes of addicted parents (failure to meet a child's immediate needs (caretaking impairment), presence of a drug-exposed infant, cognitive deficiency). (post-event)
- Dual Diagnosis (impacts pre-event, event, and post-event)

Resource Needs They May Have Due to These Crises

- Substance Abuse Counseling
- Mental Health Counseling due to dual diagnosis
- Medical treatment (naloxone lifesaving treatment works to reverse an overdose)
- Peer counseling clients have a strong preference for peer workers over emergency medical professionals based on trust issues and past negative experiences (health professionals frequently lack adequate training in substance use, and commonly hold negative/stereotypical view of individuals with drug related problems.
- Supervised Consumption Rooms (to reduce the number of overdoses)
- Better health insurance plans and reduction of social, ethnic and financial inequalities
